he Avery name was brought to America around 1865 when Charles Avery and his wife came from Devonshire, England to Manisou Island in Wildfowl Bay in the Michigan Thumb area.

Initially Charles, a farmer, settled on the island because they needed a place for their animals without having to build fences. However, they were required to bring all of their supplies by boat.

Later the family moved and settled in Fairhaven Township, Sebewaing, Michigan.

In 1951 the couple purchased property on Busch Road in Birch Run Township.

The couple raised three children: Lillie Stafford (1932-1968) a homemaker, Robert Clarence (b. 1936) and Cleo Ann (1945-1970), an accountant.
